
WTBBL Recommended Reads: In Favor of The Ampersand (&)



Perhaps even more divisive than the much-contested Oxford Comma is that little piece of punctuation, our friend The Ampersand, otherwise knowns as the And Sign. Outcast from "professional writing," the ampersand as we know it today developed out of shorthand "et" – Latin for "and." But the ampersand has a variety of uses in many different areas, with examples including denoting partnerships between two or more people (Tiffany & Co.), crediting screenwriters who wrote in close collaboration, applications in computer coding languages, and to combine two unique words into one idea (Rhythm & Blues, or R&B). It's even in our library's name! So, without further ado, let's celebrate our trampled-upon friend with these book titles that deliberately chose to skip the "and" in favor of &.

Serpent & Dove by Shelby Mahurin, 2019. (DB99016) Two years ago, Louise le Blanc fled her coven and took shelter in the city of Cesarine, forsaking all magic and living off whatever she could steal. There, witches like Lou are hunted. They are feared. And they are burned. As a huntsman of the Church, Reid Diggory has lived his life by one principle: Thou shalt not suffer a witch to live. But when Lou pulls a wicked stunt, the two are forced into an impossible situation—marriage.

Lou, unable to ignore her growing feelings, yet powerless to change what she is, must make a choice. And love makes fools of us all. – Book Description from the Publisher

Is it a spell that's made her the toast of the town--or could it possibly have something to do with the charm-bag under Oliver's bed? And speaking of Oliver, just how long can Cecelia and Kate make excuses for him? Ever since he was turned into a tree, he hasn't bothered to tell anyone where he is! A Boat, A Whale & A Walrus: Menus and Stories by

Renee Erickson, with Jess Thomson, 2014. (DBC00418) One of the country's most acclaimed chefs, James Beard Award Winner Renee Erickson is the owner of several Seattle restaurants: The Whale Wins, Boat Street Kitchen, The Walrus and the Carpenter, and Bateau, among others. This iconic cookbook is her love letter to the fresh seasonal food that defines the Pacific Northwest. Defined by the bounty of the Puget Sound region, as well as by French cuisine, it's filled with seasonal, personal menus like Renee's Fourth of July Crab Feast, Wild Foods Dinner, and a fall pickling party.
