Legends & Lattes: A Novel of High Fantasy and Low Stakes by Travis Baldree, 2022. (BR024733, DB111420, en español DB122449)

After a lifetime of bounties and bloodshed, Viv is hanging up her sword. The battle-weary orc aims to start fresh, opening the first coffee shop in the city of Thune. But old and new rivals stand in the way— not to mention the fact that no one has the faintest idea what coffee actually is. –description from publisher's website

**A Darker Shade of Magic** by Victoria Schwab, 2015. (BR020752, DB081154, en español DBG17674)

Kell is one of the last Antari—magicians with a rare ability to travel between parallel Londons; Red, Grey, White, and, once upon a time, Black. Officially, Kell serves the rulers of Red London as an ambassador, traveling between White London and the court of George III in Grey London, the one without any magic left. Unofficially, Kell is a smuggler, servicing people willing to pay for small glimpses of another world. After an exchange goes awry, Kell escapes to Grey London and runs into cutpurse Delilah Bard, who first robs him, then saves him from a deadly enemy, and finally forces Kell to spirit her to another world for a proper adventure. Now perilous magic is afoot, and treachery lurks at every turn. To save all of the worlds, they'll first need to stay alive. –description from publisher's website

The Girl Who Drank the Moon by Kelly Barnhill, 2016. (BR021836, DB085739)

Every year, the people of the Protectorate leave a baby as an offering to the witch who lives in the forest, hoping this sacrifice will keep her from terrorizing their town. But the witch in the Forest, Xan, is kind. Xan rescues the children and delivers them to welcoming families on the other side of the forest, nourishing the babies with starlight on the journey. One year, Xan accidentally feeds a baby moonlight instead of starlight, filling the ordinary child with extraordinary magic. Xan decides she must raise this girl, whom she calls Luna, as her own. #### **Under a Painted Sky** by Stacey Lee, 2015. (DBC06850)

Missouri, 1849: Samantha dreams of moving back to New York to be a professional musician—not an easy thing if you're a girl, and harder still if you're Chinese. A tragic accident dashes any hopes of fulfilling her dream, and instead, leaves her fearing for her life. With the help of Annamae, on the run herself from slavery, Samantha flees town for the unknown frontier. But life on the Oregon Trail is unsafe for two girls, so they disguise themselves as Sammy and Andy, two boys headed for the California gold rush. Sammy and Andy forge a powerful bond as they each search for a link to their past, and struggle to avoid any unwanted attention. – description from Goodreads

## **Light from Uncommon Stars** by Ryka Aoki, 2021. (<u>BR024241</u>, <u>DB105930</u>)

Shizuka Satomi made a deal with the devil to escape damnation: she must entice seven other violin prodigies to trade their souls for success. She has already delivered six. When Katrina Nguyen, a young transgender runaway, catches Shizuka's ear with her wild talent, Shizuka can almost feel the curse lifting. But in a donut shop off a bustling highway in the San Gabriel Valley, Shizuka meets Lan Tran, retired starship captain, interstellar refugee, and mother of four. Shizuka doesn't have time for crushes or coffee dates, what with her very soul on the line, but Lan's kind smile and eyes like stars might just redefine a soul's worth. And maybe something as small as a warm donut is powerful enough to break a curse as vast as the California coastline. –description adapted from Goodreads

#### Sandry's Book by Tamora Pierce, 1997. (DB049333)

First book in the Circle of Magic series. With her gift of weaving silk thread and creating light, Sandry is brought to the Winding Circle community. There she meets Briar, a former thief who has a way with plants; Daja, an outcast gifted at metalcraft; and Tris, whose connection with the weather unsettles everyone, including herself. At Winding Circle, the four misfits are taught how to use their magic - and to trust one another. – description from Goodreads

**The Thursday Murder Club** by Richard Osman, 2020. (DB100981, en español DB104861)

In a peaceful retirement village, four unlikely friends meet weekly in the Jigsaw Room to discuss unsolved crimes; together they call themselves the Thursday Murder Club. When a local developer is found dead with a mysterious photograph left next to the body, the Thursday Murder Club suddenly find themselves in the middle of their first live case. As the bodies begin to pile up, can our unorthodox but brilliant gang catch the killer, before it's too late? – description from publisher's website

**Witch King** by Martha Wells, 2023. (<u>DB114938</u>, en español <u>DB123734</u>)

After being murdered, his consciousness dormant and unaware of the passing of time, demon Kai wakes to find a lesser mage attempting to harness Kai's magic to his own advantage. That was never going to go well. But why was Kai imprisoned in the first place? What has changed in the world since his assassination?
